The Project

Project Location	Cardales Meadow Wildlife Reserve, DE65 6BH, England, United Kingdom (https://www.google.co.uk/maps/search/Cardales+Meadow/@52.8699007,-1.5349605,16.75z) The group are looking for support with to their conservation and environmental work at Cardale's Meadow wildlife reserve. The two priority tasks are the laying of new hedgerow to protect their new butterfly conservation mound (shown below), and some habitat work around the pond area.
Project Overview	This will comprise of bundling , trimming and moving felled branches, creating a structure for the hedgerow and laying the branches to create a barrier around the new butterfly conservation area. There are also a number of smaller projects in and around the lower pond/wildlife release area to create habitat for wildlife. This will include stone work and relocation of material to create a basking area/bee nesting area.
	Tools will be provided (for example wheel barrows, spades, forks, mower/strimmer (subject to risk assessment) etc), however, the volunteers will be responsible for ensuring they are dressed appropriately, have food and refreshments and are wearing suitable footwear and brining their own gardening gloves and safety glasses.

A gazebo will be provided for shelter in the event of inclement weather - toilet facilities are a short car journey (max. 2 - 3 minutes) at a local community cafe. Parking for vehicles on roadside adjacent to the area.

Conditions of Participation

Participants in the project **must**:

Standard Outdoor Groundwork and Gardening Duties

Below are the duties volunteers will be undertaking and the physical requirements involved.

- Moving and working on the project site, involving:
 - Lifting and carrying equipment and materials;
 - Bending;

- Use of hand tools, involving:
 - Hand dexterity.
- Use of machinery, involving:
 - Lifting and carrying equipment.

Incident, Accident or Near Miss Reporting

Ensuring the wellbeing and safety of all participants as a priority.

The procedure for reporting accidents or near misses is as follows:

- Alert other volunteers, and/or the project leader immediately.
- Review the required level of medical attention.
 - Requires first aid only record the incident, and notify the project leader who will then follow the organisations policies and or procedures.
 - **Requires medical assistance** ensure that the person involved is safe from further injury, and seek medical assistance. As soon as possible record the incident, and notify the project leader who will then follow the organisations policies and or procedures.
 - **Requires urgent/critical medical assistance** determine whether it is safe to approach the casualty and that yourself and anyone else isn't in a position also to become a casualty. For example, this could be stopping any oncoming traffic, looking out for live electricity, looking out for any places you could fall or trip over. Once you can confirm there is no potential danger, call 999 and begin to assess the injuries. As soon as possible record the incident, and notify the project leader who will then follow the organisations policies and or procedures.
- Do not admit liability or indicate the organisation will meet any claims.
